

Sumter County, FL -

The Buena Vista Boulevard Extension from Meggison Road to SR 44 Project will commence the week of January 17, 2022. This project will provide a new four-lane divided roadway connecting Meggison Road and SR 44. This project will include the construction of two roundabouts, two drainage retention areas, two bridge structures and retaining walls, soil stabilization columns, a new mast arm traffic signal at the intersection with SR 44, a new eight-inch force main within the project limits, and landscaping and irrigation.



Please use caution when traveling Buena Vista Boulevard, SR 44, and Heritage Boulevard/Springfield Way. Lane closures will be utilized during the day and night hours. Heavy machinery will be working near the travel way. Please use caution to protect yourselves and our construction workers. The anticipated completion of the project is December 2022.

Is your sewer backing up? Is water flowing out of your yard and down the street?

If your answer is yes, call us at 352-750-0000!

The District Utilities Department and their contractor Jacobs are responsible for maintaining the water and sewer mains that service your home for the majority of areas within The Villages. If you reside in Phillips Villas or Soulliere Villas, please contact Marion County Utilities at 352-307-6000 for sewer issues. For all other residents, please contact the District at 352-750-0000. For water service, the utility provider's responsibility ends at the brass portion of the water meter and the homeowner's responsibility begins at the PVC connection side of the water meter. For sewer service, the utility provider's responsibility ends at the 6" cleanout located in the utility right of way in the front of your home.

If your lights go out, you typically would call the electric company to confirm whether or not there is a problem with their service. For water or sewer issues, many people tend to call a plumber first. Please call us at 352-750-0000 so that we can evaluate our side of the sewer system and determine where the issue is located. If it is found that the issue is on the District side, we will make repairs. If the issue is on the homeowner's side, we will let you know and then you can contact a repair provider such as a plumber.

Please note that the District will not evaluate any issues with leaking water inside your home, only sewer issues.

Recreation Room Use

Any unused room may be reserved any time within 24 hours. If requesting a preset room, the room must be put back to its original setup. If requesting a banquet room, minimal setups may be provided. Setups for these rooms are limited to staff availability and up to 2 tables with 16 chairs. These items are not provided: audio visual including televisions and video equipment, podiums and computers. Table Tennis will be set up on request in available meeting rooms. Card rooms are preset. We will allow use of 1 wired mic, based on availability, in addition to the items listed.

The intent of this service is to provide limited, infrequent use by residents and resident lifestyle volunteer groups. The maximum allotted time is 3.5 hours.

When items are found at any of The Villages Recreation Facilities the following steps will take place:

- 1. If an individual claims an item he/she is to fill out the Recreation Department Lost & Found Claim Form. Claim report forms will be kept on file at the facility Recreation Service Representative's desk for a period of 6 months.
- 2. No items are to be released without a photo ID, signature and phone number.
- **3.** After the end of each month all remaining items will be donated to a local charitable organization as designated by the District. The Recreation & Parks Dept. has partnered with The Villages Auxiliary Hospital, which is a non-profit, charitable organization that serves our community.

To provide consistent and uniform guidelines for creating awareness and guidance to staff and participants regarding inclement weather that may impact the health, safety and well-being of staff, volunteers, participants, and facilities.

GUIDELINES FOR RECREATION FACILITIES

The following guidelines are recommended for recreation sponsored activities, leagues, tournaments, and special events in the event of inclement weather.

The Recreation Department has the right to close facilities and/or cancel/postpone or relocate activities at Recreation facilities for public safety in the event of any storm warnings issued by the National Weather Service, Public Safety, or Recreation Department for any tornadoes, hurricanes or other severe storms.

Cancellations, postponements and relocation of activities will be done in a timely manner.

Sponsored activities will be canceled/postponed a minimum of thirty minutes to one hour prior to the scheduled play time depending on the type of activity. Emergency alert warnings may require prompt cancellations.

NOTIFICATION PROCESS

Depending on the type of weather event and impact, staff will communicate via email, word of mouth, posting on the website, or other media sources regarding any cancellation/postponing information. Weather conditions and the type of facility may vary from center to center in The Villages community.

INCLEMENT WEATHER

Inclement weather is defined as rain, wind, lightning and/or severe conditions (tornado, hurricane, thunderstorm watch/warnings) that compromise the safety of the participants, staff, volunteers and/or the condition of the facility.

 In the event of Inclement weather, the Recreation Department recommends patrons at outdoor recreation areas find shelter and wait at least 30 minutes or longer prior to resuming safe normal activities as deemed advisable by a Public Safety or National Weather Service Advisory.

WEATHER TEMPERATURE

Cancellations/postponements related to Temperature.

TEMPERATURE GUIDELINES

- Outside temperature of 35 degrees or lower.
- Outside temperature with a heat index of 104 degrees or higher.

PROTOCOL

 District Staff will monitor weather conditions through various media sources that include, but are not limited to, WVLG and wunderground.com (La Zamora station).



LAKE SUMTER LINE – BOAT TOURS, PONTOON BOAT TOURS, FISHING EXCURSIONS AND KAYAKING

Cancellations due to inclement weather will be made by the Recreation staff in charge of the boats an hour prior to the first scheduled trip.

CANCELLATIONS WILL OCCUR FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS:

AIR TEMPERATURE POLICY

- If the forecast temperature for 12:00 noon will be below 50°F, operations will be canceled.
- If the forecast temperature for 12:00 noon will be between 50°F and 55°F, the decision to cancel will be at the discretion of the scheduled Captains.
- During summer, if the forecast heat index for 12:00 noon will be 95° or higher, operations will be canceled.
- If the decision is to cancel operations, all scheduled crew are to be advised no later than 60 minutes prior to the scheduled start time (earlier if possible).

HIGH WIND POLICY

- If medium winds are present (10-16 mph), boats may operate at Captain's discretion. (Wind speed measurements are approximate based on the best available information.)
- If high winds are present (above 17 mph), operations will be suspended.
- If very high winds (above 50 mph) are forecast, boats are to be retied in a "sprung out" format to avoid contact with the dock and/or sea wall.
- Rain, wind, lightning and/or severe conditions (tomado, hurricane, thunderstorm watch/ warnings) that compromise the safety of patrons, staff and the conditions of boats and docks.

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OPEN PLAY & RESIDENT SPONSORED ACTIVITIES

Participants assume full responsibility for any risk of bodily injury arising out of, or in any way connected with, participation or involvement in, or presence at, the activity or program. For the safety and well-being of the public, the Recreation Department may close facilities at any time due to weather conditions.

RAIN DELAYS

If it is raining before the start of play but stops before the scheduled play time, play will continue as planned if the fields/courts are deemed playable. If rain continues to fall during the scheduled play time, recreation staff/volunteers may declare a rain delay. After a reasonable amount of time, staff will decide whether the weather has improved and will be suitable for play or if the activity should be declared a rain out.

INSIDE FACILITIES

Will be closed as directed by the Director of Recreation.

DISCLAIMER

If at any time facility/field conditions or weather conditions are deemed unsafe, the District Recreation Department reserves the right to cancel or postpone any activity. At all times participants play at their own risk.

 District Staff (on-site recreation staff i.e. athletic/recreation assistant) will receive direction from the department manager or supervisor if a cancellation/postponements process is recommended based on the above guidelines.

PROCESS

- District Staff (on-site recreation staff i.e. athletic/recreation assistant) will notify activity representatives and/or participants via phone and/or in person that the recreation sponsored event(s) is recommended to be canceled/postponed until further notice.
- District staff will notify activity representatives when the temperature allows for safe conditions and whether the event(s) may continue.

FUNSHINE BINGO

Funshine Bingo will be canceled 30 minutes prior to the start time of the bingo cards being sold based on the following:

- Outside temperature of 50 degrees or lower.
- Outside temperature with a heat index of 104 degrees or higher.
- Rain, wind, lightning and/or severe conditions (tornado, hurricane, thunderstorm watch/ warnings) that compromise the safety of the participants or the condition of the facility.

SWIMMING POOLS

- Recreation staff will be in charge of Family & Sports Pools that are on-site.
- Neighborhood Adult pools off site and other outdoor recreation areas will be selfmonitored.
 - For those pools scheduled for 90 minute pool checks, staff is to clear the swimming pool and wait the allotted 30 minutes for the weather to clear. If the weather does not clear, staff is to notify their manager and leave.
- Recreation staff and Community Watch staff
 who are in the area during inclement weather
 will use their best judgment to encourage and
 inform patrons to leave the pool or outdoor
 recreation areas if they deem necessary.
- If pool temperatures drop below 81 degrees, a sign will be posted at the entrance of the pool informing residents of the temperature change. The pool will remain open.

CANCELLATIONS WILL OCCUR FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS:

- Outside temperature of 35 degrees or lower.
- Rain, wind, lightning and/or severe conditions (tornado, hurricane, thunderstorm watch/warnings) that compromise the safety of the participants or the condition of the facility.





Did You Know???



Another one of the services that Community Watch provides, each day and night, is locating broken sprinkler heads. Patrol drivers, while in the course of their duties each shift, will notice a broken sprinkler head. Whether on District property or on private property, the driver will mark the broken sprinkler with a flag to indicate where that sprinkler is, even when the water is off. The driver will then call the location into dispatch of the sprinkler and whether the sprinkler is on District or private property. Dispatch will then write up a work order if the sprinkler is on District property.

If the sprinkler is on private property, Dispatch will search for the homeowner's information and contact the homeowner to inform them of the broken sprinkler head. Dispatch will explain to them exactly where on the property it is located and will inform them of the blue flag indicating the broken sprinkler. Most often the homeowner does not realize the sprinkler head is broken, because most sprinklers are set to go off in the very early morning hours.

Do you know the rules of the roundabout?



- 1 Slow Down.
- 2 Look Around.
- 3 Be Ready to Yield.

A roundabout is a circular intersection design where traffic travels at low speed around a central island and entering traffic must yield to circulating traffic. Roundabouts are safer and more efficient than traditional intersections.

The geometry of a roundabout is key to controlling the speed at which traffic enters and maneuvers through the intersection, providing the following benefits:

- Lower severity of collisions that may occur, resulting in significantly fewer severe injuries.
- Increased likelihood of drivers yielding to pedestrians at crosswalks.
- Time for drivers to judge and enter a comfortable gap in circulating traffic.

Modern Roundabouts... as easy as 1, 2, 3.



- Going slower provides more time to make decisions and be better prepared to yield to other road users.
- By entering the roundabout at a slower speed, crashes that do happen are much less severe.
- Slowing down helps drivers do a better job seeing pedestrians and bicycles and sharing the road with them.



- Drivers should choose the lane for where they want to go after the roundabout. Signs and markings help them select a lane.
- Like most other intersections, drivers use the left lane to go left, the right lane to go right, and either lane to go straight through, unless otherwise indicated.
- Drivers should keep looking around and check the crosswalks to see if anyone is waiting to cross or is already crossing.
 Drivers should be ready to stop and let them safely finish.




- Drivers must yield to traffic in all lanes of the roundabout, not just in the lane closest to them.
- If large vehicles like trucks or buses are in the roundabout, drivers should give them space and avoid driving next to them inside the roundabout.
- Drivers should follow the pavernent markings to stay in the correct lane as they leave the roundabout. They should look around one more time for anyone in the crosswalk and be ready to yield as the drivers exit.




Have you ever wondered why the irrigation is running along a roadway for a mile or two or on a golf course for days after an extreme amount of rain has fallen? District Property Management monitors the water level in water retention basins throughout the community. When you see irrigation running after a large rain event, it is usually due to the fact that the water retention areas throughout The Villages are above the recommended level and must be lowered. These measures are in place to make room for more rain water, which is collected from the streets, yards and golf courses, should there be a second rain event coming.

Spear Phishing: Email-based social engineering targeting a specific person or role.

Stop, look, and think before you click that link or open that attachment.

IN-PERSON ATTACKS

USB Attacks: An attack that uses a thumb drive to install malware on your computer.

Tailgating: When a hacker bypasses physical access controls by following an authorized person inside.

Stop, look, and think before allowing someone in that you don't recognize or plugging any external media into your computer.

PHONE ATTACKS

Smishing: Text-based social engineering.

Vishing: Over-the-phone-based social engineering.

Stop, look, and think before you surrender confidential information or take action on an urgent request.

Social Engineering

Social engineering is the art of manipulating, influencing, or deceiving you into taking some action that isn't in your own best interest or in the best interest of your organization.

The goal of social engineers is to obtain your trust, then exploit that relationship to coax you into either divulging sensitive information about yourself or your organization or giving them access to your network.

Hags

Red flags are a sign of danger or a problem. They can be as subtle as an uneasy feeling or as obvious as an email about "suspicious charges" from a bank that you don't even have an account with.

Pay attention to these warning signs as they can alert you to a social engineering attack!

Since phishing is the most common form of social engineering, let's take a closer look at seven areas in an email and their corresponding red flags.


- An email coming from an unknown address.
- You know the sender (or the organization), but the email is unexpected or out of character.

 You were copied on an email and you don't know the other people it was sent to.

 You receive an email that you would usually get during normal business hours, but it was sent at 3:00 a.m.

HYPERLINKS

- There are misspellings in the link.
- The email contains hyperlinks asking you to take an action.
- When you hover your cursor over the link, the link address is for a different website.




How do I find information about where I can fish in The Villages?

To find a complete set of fishing guidelines and map of local fishing areas, follow the steps below.





Defensive Driving

It's that time of year when roads are at their most congested as people flock to the beautiful Florida winter weather. With more people on the roads around this time of year, and always, it is important to drive defensively. Defensive driving is essentially driving in a manner that utilizes safe driving strategies to enable motorists to address identified hazards in a predictable manner. Exercising defensive driving techniques can reduce your driving risks by helping you anticipate situations and make well-informed decisions.

Traffic Crashes

Losses from traffic crashes have both social and personal impacts. Approximately 41,000 people die annually as a result of traffic collisions, with an additional 3,236,000 injuries. About 38% of all fatal car crashes are alcohol related with another 30% attributed to speeding.

The causes of these crashes, emotional impact and cost in dollars spent on car crashes are typically covered in defensive driving courses. The goal of good defensive driving is to reduce the risk of these accidents by properly educating drivers to exercise caution and good judgment while driving.

Psychological Factors

On the roadways, drivers have to deal with several factors that can affect their driving. Defensive driving courses tend to focus on how drivers can overcome negative psychological factors such as unneeded stress, fatigue, emotional distress and road rage.



The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration conservatively estimates that 100,000 police-reported crashes are the direct result of driver fatigue each year. This results in an estimated 1,550 deaths, 71,000 injuries, and \$12.5 billion in monetary losses.



Human Factors — DUI

Driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol continues to impact thousands of American drivers each year. While the specific effect of each drug on your body takes place in differing stages, the effect of drivers operating a vehicle while under the influence is disastrous.

DUI is an offense under Florida law. The offense is proved by impairment of "normal faculties" or unlawful blood alcohol or breath alcohol level of .08 or above.

The Dynamics of a Crash

Vehicle crashes are almost always a preventable result of a series of events. The combination of speed, place of impact and size of object being impacted can determine the severity of the crash. In every accident, however, the act of one vehicle hitting another vehicle or other object is not the only collision that can occur.

The concept of the second collision, in which the driver and other passengers collides with the windshield, seat or other object within the car when not wearing a seat belt can be just as dangerous as the initial collision.

Defensive driving courses address the issue of vehicle crashes and second collisions by listing the elements of a crash and illustrating how the forces of impact can be avoided or limited.

Safety Equipment


Approximately half of all deaths that are result of an automobile crash could have been avoided if the victim were wearing a safety belt properly. Of course safety belts are only the most commonly thought of vehicle safety equipment. Items such as air bags, child safety seats and head rests all serve to protect drivers and passengers and reduce the risk of injury or death in the event of a crash. Defensive driving courses offer tips on how to use these devices properly and ensure your safety when traveling the roadways.



Crash Prevention Techniques

The key to any good defensive driving strategy is knowing how to avoid traffic crashes and recognize potential hazards before it's too late. In a typical defensive driving course, students learn crucial crash prevention techniques that include:

- Scanning the roadway and adapting to surroundings
- Employing the three to four second rule for following distances
- Knowing your vehicle's stopping distance
- Being aware of reaction distance
- Environment hazards
- Vehicle emergencies
- · Sharing the road
- · Passing and necessary clear distance
- Right of way
- Speed adjustments and railroad crossings
- Be aware of your surroundings always pay attention



Being a defensive driver is being a good driver.

Buckle up, never drive impaired whether it be alcohol, prescription medications, anger or fatigue. Share the roadways but know the right of way. Always scan the roadways and be aware of your surroundings. Do not make sudden decisions that can potentially cause a wreck. Never tailgate. There should always be a vehicle length between you and the car ahead of you. Defensive driving is not only for vehicles, but all rules of the road should be followed in golf carts. Everyone wants to make it home, don't be the reason that someone doesn't.
