Community Watch Wellness Checks Play an Important Role

Sometimes persistence pays off, especially if you are a Community Watch (CW) Dispatcher. Recently, Patrol Driver Robert Livingston and Dispatcher Candy Langton proved that point while performing a wellness check after noticing that several newspapers had piled up in a resident's driveway.

On May 1, 2022, Community Watch Patrol Driver Robert Livingston spotted two newspapers in the driveway of a Village of Fernandina residence. When Robert approached the house, he noticed four more newspapers sitting by the door. When he did not get a response by knocking on the door, he checked with the neighbors on both sides of the home to see if they had any information on the resident. When the neighbors stated that they hadn't seen the homeowner in a few days, that raised major red flags for Robert. He immediately called CW Dispatch to report his findings and Dispatcher Candy Langton took charge.

Following her dashboard protocols, Candy first attempted to call the homeowner. When she did not get an answer, she then called the two emergency contacts listed and had to leave both of them messages. Next, she called all local hospitals to see if the resident was a patient. After learning that he was not, red flags began to go off in Candy's head too. At this time, one of the resident's emergency contacts, his sister, called Candy back and said she would try and make contact with him. After not being able to reach him either, she called back sounding worried and told Candy she would like law enforcement to be called. Sumter County Sheriff's Office (SCSO) was then contacted to perform a well-being check on the resident. Patrol Driver Robert Livingston, who was still at the residence, reported that SCSO arrived with two deputies who made the decision to breach the front door and make entry into the home. SCSO then called for backup and EMS, Sumter Ambulance and The Villages Public Safety Department soon arrived on the scene. The resident was transported from the home to the hospital and CW planned to do extra patrols on the home as the lock on the front door was broken during entry.

With a good eye from a CW Patrol Driver and the persistence of a CW Dispatcher, this resident was able to receive proper emergency care and is going to be okay. Thank you to the Community Watch team members and to our first responders for ensuring the safety and well-being of this Villager.

MOSQUITO BITE PREVENTION

HOW TO PROTECT AGAINST MOSQUITO BITES



Mosquitoes bite during the day and night. They live indoors and outdoors. Protect your family from mosquito bites. Use insect repellent, wear long-sleeved shirts and pants, and take steps to control mosquitoes indoors and outdoors.

Use insect repellent


 Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellents with one of the following active ingredients: DEET, picaridin, IR3535,oil of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, or 2-undecanone.



- · Always follow product label instructions.
- · Reapply insect repellent as directed.
 - » Do not spray repellent on the skin under clothing.
 - » If you are also using sunscreen, apply sunscreen first and insect repellent second.
- The effectiveness of non-EPA registered insect repellents, including some natural repellents, is not known.

Wear long-sleeved shirts, pants Treat clothes and gear

- · Wear long-sleeved shirts and pants.
- Treat items such as boots, pants, socks, and tents with permethrin or buy permethrin-treated clothing and gear.
 - » Permethrin is an insecticide that kills or repels mosquitoes.
- » Permethrin-treated clothing will protect you after multiple washings. See product information to find out how long the protection will last.
- » If treating items yourself, follow the product instructions.
- Do not use permethrin products directly on skin.

MOSQUITO BITE PREVENTION

Protect babies and children

- · Always follow instructions when applying insect repellent to children.
- Do not use insect repellent on babies younger than 2 months old.
 - » Instead dress your child in clothing that covers arms and legs.
 - » Cover strollers and baby carriers with mosquito netting.
- Do not use products containing oil of lernon eucalyptus (OLE) or para-menthane-diol (PMD) on children younger than 3 years old.
- Do not apply insect repellent onto a child's hands, eyes, mouth, cuts or irritated skin.
 - » Adults: spray insect repellent onto your hands and then apply to a child's face.





Control mosquitoes indoors

- Keep windows and doors shut and use air conditioning if possible.
- · Use, install, or repair window and door screens.
- Once a week, empty or throw out any items that hold water like vases and flowerpot saucers.
- Use an indoor insect fogger or indoor insect spray to kill mosquitoes and treat areas where they rest. These products work immediately, but may need to be reapplied. Always follow label instructions.

Control mosquitoes outdoors

- Once a week, empty or throw out any items that hold water like vases and flowerpot saucers.
- · Tightly cover water storage containers (buckets, rain barrels, etc.)
- For containers without lids, use mesh with holes smaller than an adult mosquito.
- Use larvicides to treat large containers of water that will not be used for drinking and cannot be covered or dumped out.
- Use an outdoor insect spray in dark humid areas where mosquitoes rest, like under patio furniture or in the carpet or garage. Always follow label instructions.
- If you have a septic tank, repair cracks or gaps. Cover vent or plumbing pipe openings using mesh with holes smaller than an adult mosquito.

Help Protect our Villages Water System



Dog waste is becoming an increasing concern for the Environmental Protection Agency. They estimate that just 2-3 days' worth of waste from only 100 dogs can contribute enough bacteria to temporarily close a bay and all watershed areas to swimming or shell-fishing within 20 miles.

Consider this: There are now more than 77 million dogs living in the United States and the average dog deposits about 3/4 pounds of waste each day. What first appears as a small amount quickly adds up. That amounts to 267,500 tractor-trailers filled with dog waste. Lined up, they would stretch 3,800 miles, from Boston to Seattle. That's 10 million tons each year.

Some people are conscientious about picking up after their dogs, but many are not, and the risks are having an impact on our community. Pet waste is one of the many contributors to stormwater pollution that can degrade water quality. During rainfall, pet waste left on lawns, beaches, trails, and sidewalks washes into storm drains or into water bodies. Additionally, many are tossing their "doggie bags" of pet waste into our stormwater system. This is extremely damaging to our infrastructure and our groundwater system (which is the water you drink). Plastic bags are typically non-biodegradable and can clog the stormwater system which leads to premature failure and localized flooding, and the waste within those dog bags will eventually enter the groundwater system releasing bacteria which ultimately enters our Florida Aquifer system.



Dog waste is more than just a gross and unsightly mess — it's an environmental pollutant and a human health hazard. When left on the ground or worse, thrown into a stormwater drain, the waste eventually breaks down and washes into the water supply, polluting our basins, streams, creeks, and other local waterways. This results in algae blooms — a stagnant blanket of green over our water bodies.

We ask that you please take a moment to realize that one of the leading sources of water pollution in communities across America is entirely preventable and can be eliminated overnight. Dog owners are responsible for picking up after their pets and throwing any waste into a trash receptacle. Never throw dog waste into stormwater drains, stormwater inlets, or any of our more than 500 lakes, basins and ponds in The Villages.

Our mission is to make The Villages safer for everyone and ensure that everyone enjoys living, working and playing in Florida's Friendliest Hometown. Please help us, and The Villages, by picking up after your pooch and disposing of it properly.

It's May, which means Florida is heating up. May is National Heat Awareness month. Working outside in extreme heat, or enjoying the weather on the weekends can cause heat-related illness if not prevented. This May, practice safe measures and keep them in mind year-round when out in the hot, humid, Florida weather.

What are the different types of heat illness?

HEAT STROKE:

- High body temperature (103°F or higher)
- Hot, red, dry, or damp skin
- Fast, strong pulse
- Headache, dizziness, or confusion
- Loss of consciousness (passing out)
- Nausea



- 1. Call 911 right away.
- 2. Move the person to a cooler place.
- 3. Help lower the person's temperature with cool cloths or a cool bath.
- 4. Do not give the person anything to drink.

HEAT EXHAUSTION:

- Heavy sweating
- · Cold, pale, and clammy skin
- Fast, weak pulse
- · Nausea or vomiting
- Muscle cramps
- Tiredness or weakness
- Dizziness, headache or fainting

Know what to do:

- 1. Move to a cool place.
- 2. Put loose, cool and wet cloths on your body or take a cool bath.
- 3. Sip water.
- 4. Get medical help right away if you are throwing up, symptoms get worse or last longer than 1 hour.







HEAT CRAMPS:

- Heavy sweating during intense exercise
- Muscle pain or spasms

Know what to do:

- 1. Stop physical activity and cool down.
- 2. Drink water or a sports drink.
- 3. Wait for cramps to go away before additional physical activity.
- 4. Get medical help right away if on a low-sodium diet, have heart problems, or have cramps lasting longer than 1 hour.

SUNBURN:

- · Painful, red, and warm skin
- Blisters on the skin

Know what to do:

- 1. Prevention always wear sunscreen. Apply it to your skin every day. Avoid sun in the middle of the day, from around 10 AM to 3 PM. The ultraviolet rays, which cause sunburn, are strongest during this time. Wear protective clothing and wear sunglasses that filter UV light.
- 2. If you do get burned, stay out of the sun until sunburn heals.
- 3. Put on cool cloths or take a cool bath.
- 4. Use moisturizing lotion on sunburned areas.
- 5. Do not break blisters.

HEAT RASH:

Red clusters of small blisters that look like pimples on the skin

Know what to do:

- 1. Stay in a cool, dry place.
- 2. Keep the rash dry.
- 3. Use baby powder to soothe.



The Villages Community Development Districts Risk Management

DEHYDRATION:

- Thirst
- · Less-frequent urination
- Dry skin
- Fatigue
- · Light-headedness
- Dizziness
- Confusion
- Dry mouth and mucous membranes
- · Increased heart rate and breathing

Know what to do:

1. Prevention — make sure you have plenty of water or fluids with electrolytes. Don't wait until you're thirsty; hydrate consistently while working by drinking approximately 1 cup every 15-20 minutes.



2. Simple rehydration is recommended by drinking fluids. Many sports drinks on the market effectively restore body fluids, electrolytes, and salt balance. Cases of serious dehydration should be treated as a medical emergency, and hospitalization, along with intravenous fluids, is necessary. Immediate action should be taken.

Heat Illness is preventable. Follow heat safety prevention to keep you and your loved ones safe this summer.

goods and services in accordance with Florida State Statutes. All goods and
services are purchased using sound procurement practices, involving a fair
market quotation, or a competitive solicitation process.

OUR PROCUREMENT PROCESS

We encourage and welcome all vendors who offer quality goods and services to participate in the procurement process. Examples of agreements currently in place include: Civil, Environmental, Structural and Utility Engineering services, Janitorial services, Landscaping services, and Utility operations.

For goods or services valued at \$50,000 and over, the Purchasing Department will use one or more of the following methods of procurement:

- Invitation to Bid (ITB): Awarded to the lowest, most responsible and responsive bidder.
- · Request For Proposal (RFP): Awarded based on highest ranked proposer.
- Request For Qualifications (RFQ): Awarded based on qualifications only.
- Request For Information (RFI): Tool used to seek information about products or services available in the marketplace.

QUOTING REQUIREMENTS

The Purchasing Policies provide processes to acquire goods and services based on dollar thresholds for purchases less than \$50,000, utilizing competitive written quotes. The Purchasing Department requires the following guidelines be used by District departments for all acquisitions and formal solicitations.


- Estimated value less than \$5,000:
 Although quotes are not required, they are encouraged.
- Estimated value between \$5,000 and \$24,999.99:
 Three quotes are required; can use on-line pricing & catalogs.
- Estimated value between \$25,000 and \$49,999.99:
 Three written quotes required; specification package submitted to Purchasing to obtain the quotes.
- Estimated value of \$50,000 and over:
 Competitive formal solicitation procedures are required.

The street light behind our home is not working at night, who should I call?

You should notify the company you pay your electric bill to:

- Call DUKE Energy at 800-700-8744 or click on the following link <u>Duke Energy</u>.
- Call the City of Leesburg at 352-728-9830 or click on the following link <u>City of Leesburg Electric Department</u>.

If you are able to locate the number on the pole, please provide it when reporting the outage.





TRASH COLLECTION REMINDERS

- Bags must be placed for collection before 6:00 AM on your collection day or no sooner than 5:00 PM the night before.
- All household waste should be placed in sealed tall kitchen trash bags or 20-30 gallon trash bags (any color with the exception of red, which is used for medical waste).
- The trash bags should be left at the end of your driveway. **No** garbage cans are allowed, they will be disposed of with the household waste.
- Each bag should weigh no more than forty (40) pounds.
- Wrap broken glass or other sharp objects in newspaper and place them where they cannot cause injury.
- Limbs and branches should be bundled and tied and may not exceed 4" in diameter, 4' in length or exceed 40 pounds.

THE UNFLUSHABLES:

Keep wipes and other products from clogging your community's sewer system

With developments surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, there's lots of change and interruption in our lives. Panic buying has left some people without adequate supplies of toilet paper, and they may have no choice but to use other products in the bathroom. Therefore, it's important that we make sound decisions to prevent clogs and damage to sewer systems.

To keep wastewater systems working properly, please flush only the appropriate waste down the toilet.

WIPES CLOG PIPES, SO REMEMBER THESE TIPS:

FLUSH IT:

Biological waste (urine, feces) and toilet paper are the only materials that should be flushed down the toilet. Toilet paper breaks down in water. Other products do not.

TRASH IT:

Anything else—cotton swabs, baby wipes, wet wipes (even if marked "flushable") and paper towels. These items must be disposed of as domestic waste and NOT flushed down the toilet.





These steps will help us keep collection and treatment systems operating properly. If there's no toilet paper and you must use something else, keep a trash bin in the bathroom to dispose of non-toilet-paper products. Clean the bin and surrounding areas regularly. WATER SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

Preventative maintenance is occurring on the potable water system field valves throughout many areas of The Villages. Those customers serviced by Village Center Service Area (VCSA), Little Sumter Service Area (LSSA), North Sumter Utilities (NSU), Central Sumter Utilities (CSU) and South Sumter Utilities (SSU) that will be impacted will be notified 24 hours in advance of a temporary interruption in service and will receive the following notification:

THE PUBLIC DRINKING WATER MAINS IN YOUR AREA WILL BE SHUT DOWN TEMPORARILY FOR NEEDED MAINTENANCE. AS A PRECAUTION, UPON RETURN OF WATER SERVICE, WE ADVISE THAT <u>ALL WATER USED</u> FOR DRINKING, MAKING ICE, AND COOKING BE BOILED, FOR ALL OTHER HOUSE HOLD USES THE WATER IS ACCEPTABLE. A ROLLING BOIL OF ONE MINUTE IS SUFFICIENT. AS AN ALTERNATIVE, BOTTLED WATER MAY BE USED.

THIS "PRECAUTIONARY BOIL WATER NOTICE" WILL REMAIN IN EFFECT UNTIL THE MAINTENANCE TASK HAS BEEN COMPLETED AND A BACTERIOLOGICAL SURVEY SHOWS THAT THE WATER IS SAFE TO DRINK. THIS USUALLY CONSISTS OF A TWO-DAY SAMPLING PERIOD TO INSURE SAFE DRINKING WATER.
