Executive Golf Courses In The Villages

When it comes to golf, there is no other place in the world that comes close to The Villages. This golfing community brings endless opportunities for recreational play so residents and their guests may enjoy our many courses year-round. In 2022, approximately 2.5 million rounds of golf were played on The Villages Executive Golf Courses alone. With this much bustling activity, it is necessary to have a long-term plan for the sustainability and perpetuity of the golfing experience.

The District occasionally receives inquiries when the golf course conditions do not align with our high standards. Rest assured, the Executive Golf Maintenance team works diligently to combat the typical challenges, such as weather conditions, lack of rain, increased golfer and golf car traffic, etc., that affect and can eventually diminish, the overall condition of the courses. We appreciate all residents who have contacted us with their concerns seeking a resolution or clarification. Please know that our professionally trained staff works around the clock with our contracted maintenance crews to deliver the highest quality play conditions on our Executive Golf courses. The Executive Golf Courses are a living and breathing landscape, and their anticipated life expectancies are regularly impacted by evolving conditions. Variables such as weather and traffic may contribute to the need for enhanced revitalization needs. Golf course renovations and infrastructure improvements can and should be part of our regular planning, especially considering the constant increase in rounds played annually. Our focus remains not only on the design preservation and playability of the courses but also the aesthetics – a value that our residents and quests enjoy about the unique Villages community.

Golf Course Renovations & Maintenance:

Golf course renovations and course improvements are a top priority for the District. We recognize that the volume of rounds of golf, which far exceeds the "average", for comparable private golf courses and as a result, we have implemented an aggressive 10-year Capital Improvement Plan which will accelerate course renovations. All renovation projects and enhancements to the Executive Golf Courses will be presented to the appropriate Committee and Board as part of an overall asset management plan which consists of multiple renovations annually in addition to smaller, more frequent maintenance projects to ensure courses remain infrastructurally solid. While the average full renovation is every 20 years, we will renovate ours in the ten (10) to twelve (12) year timeframe which will include new greens, tees, fairways and bunkers while incorporating the newer turf varieties that are shade, traffic, and drought tolerant. Likewise, numerous, more frequent smaller renovation projects will include bunker sand replenishing and re-grassing tee tops. Improved bunker sand will be used during projects and drainage will be installed in wet areas on the courses. All of this will be a great addition to the golf experience, play performance and overall quality of the Executive Golf Courses.

Through our close partnership with Audubon International, we exemplify The Villages' Core Value of Stewardship, prioritizing high environmental standards and initiatives throughout the Executive Golf Courses – doing our part to preserve the natural surroundings with an emphasis on water runoff and mitigation efforts. Advances in golf course construction methods and newer turfgrass varieties aid in our efforts to provide a great recreational playing surface. As we plan improvements, we include grasses that are more shade and drought-tolerant, and more capable of handling year-round traffic.

Executive Golf Course Maintenance:

Continued maintenance is needed 365 days a year on our Executive Golf Courses. The Executive Golf Maintenance Department works hand-in-hand with our contracted maintenance teams as they execute their daily duties of golf course preparation and general maintenance. Our department schedules regular monthly course closures for maintenance to aid with general upkeep, and it is also necessary to close courses periodically for rest and rehabilitation. This gives the maintenance teams time to perform essential cultural practices such as aerification, which relieves soil compaction and provides oxygen to the grass root zone – an important step for turf recovery during and after the busy season of golf, which in The Villages is all year long.

The Executive Golf Maintenance Department oversees the contractors and provides accountability and coaching on course maintenance through on-site visits, evaluations, scheduled meetings, course ride arounds, soil testing, weekly reporting, and irrigation audits. We have enhanced the team effort with the contractors who maintain the Executive courses daily. Relationships centered on coaching, follow-through and trust will lead to the fulfillment of higher expectations and accountability and ultimately, a better round for each golfer. We have also developed a positive synergy with the Championship Golf team, collaborating to offer combined educational opportunities for course staff, and ensuring we are working toward the same high standards and common goals for water management and other industry standards.

We have also renewed our focus on environmental stewardship. Through pursuit of our Audubon certification for all 36 of our Executive Courses, we are finding ways to improve habitats for local wildlife, preserve native plant areas that require less fertilization and being good stewards of scarce water resources. The Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program for Golf Courses (ACSP) is an award-winning education and certification program that helps golf courses protect the environment and preserve the natural heritage of the game of golf. The program helps golf officials enhance valuable natural areas and wildlife habitats that golf courses provide, improve efficiency and minimize potentially harmful impacts of golf operations.

Typical Maintenance Schedule:

Golf course maintenance teams start their day at the crack of dawn, so they have time to prepare their course for golfers with little disruption. Working early, with little disruption, enables them to operate at peak efficiency. Productivity substantially decreases later in the day when employees must be more mindful of play, so maintenance teams try to get the most from the first few hours of their day, typically well before sunrise.

On a typical morning, golf course maintenance workers mow turf across all 36 Executive Golf courses. In addition to mowing, our contractors and staff change hole locations, move tee markers, rake bunkers, clean up debris, scout for pests and irrigate select areas. After their morning work, a second round of tasks begins. This work often includes mowing rough, edging cart paths, and trimming the turf around bunkers and trees. Often, much of this work is completed before lunch to maximize the play experience of our golfers.

Despite an early start, not every job can be finished before morning play; weather, contractor availability, staff size, equipment availability and the golf schedule are just a few key factors that play a significant role in maintenance productivity. Unfortunately, in the vast majority of situations, it will be necessary for maintenance work to continue after golf play has commenced. Therefore, it's important for golfers to give maintenance teams time and space as they work hard to produce great playing conditions.

Golf Course Maintenance Standards:

The Executive Golf Maintenance Department takes great pride in the work that we do to provide our residents and guests with a pleasurable and challenging playing experience. We do this by ensuring that we document our maintenance standards to clearly define resident expectations and match them with the maintenance procedures. Because these expectations are defined by direct feedback from the players, guests, staff members and other professionals, maintenance standards are a valuable tool in determining whether time and money spent in maintaining certain aspects of the Executive Golf courses are actually focused on the areas most important to the players.

Why Is Golf Maintenance Important?

Here are some facts about golf course maintenance, and what can happen if steps are not taken to care for our beautiful Executive Golf Courses:

Mowing: If there is grass growing actively, the golf course areas need to be mowed frequently. If not, aggressive measures must be taken to clean or re-grass the field to return to its normal playability state. Usually, grass on the tees and fairways should be mown at least every three days. Mowing heights can be slowly reduced for overgrown grasses, although playing quality may be different than usual, that's if these areas can even be restored at all. As for putting

greens, they become an issue, particularly if they are left to grow and not mown due to their very low normal mowing heights. Also, we use specialized grasses in many areas including the tees. One thing that should not be taken for granted is the fact that mowing is the best way to control weeds. If this is suspended for long periods, there is a higher likelihood that weeds will grow abundantly and cause more work once maintenance continues.

Irrigation: The need to irrigate depends on several elements, such as rainfall, soil type, and temperature. If the grass is not sufficiently watered, it can wither and die quickly. On the other hand, some types of grasses can tolerate drought better than others. These include Zoysia grass and Bermuda grass. Kentucky bluegrass, tall fescue, bentgrass, and Poa annua are cool-season grasses that can't tolerate drought. The type of playing surface also makes a difference. Rough areas usually tolerate dryness more than the putting greens, which are the least tolerant and won't typically survive without water for a day or two.

Fertilizer And Protectant Application: Fertilizers and wetting agents are generally applied to make sure that the turf remains healthy and provides the best playing conditions. Plant protectants, on the other hand, are applied at certain times to prevent diseases, insects, or weeds from destroying the grass or affecting playing conditions. We must periodically close courses to apply these products, or we risk turf decline because of insect and disease outbreaks. Weeds will likely invade, causing problems of playability for the rest of the season.

Bunker Maintenance: Regular bunker maintenance is essential in creating excellent playing conditions, and it also inhibits weeds from appearing in the sand. If bunkers are not routinely maintained, these weeds will soon cover the sand. Consequently, if the sand remains unrepaired, the bunkers' conditions will seriously decline. Sand washouts can ultimately lead to sand contamination, and when this happens, it must be completely replaced – more work and more cost. The bunkers, too, will need to be rebuilt as part of the overall renovation plan for Executive Golf Courses. Bunkers test a golfer's ability to either play in the sand or avoid hitting the sand. They represent a temporary handicap to be overcome with skill, determination, and luck. More than 52% of players say high-quality bunkers are essential to a positive golfing experience. Per our contract(s), bunkers are raked out three (3) times per week. Players should also rake out bunkers after all play within the bunker.

Water Features: Water retention basins, ponds and lakes are other aspects of many golf courses that require maintenance. Maintenance includes cutting the grass around the water bodies, as well as aquatic weed control. Nearly everybody of water in Florida has alligators - be aware of your surroundings at all times and don't feed, harass or approach the alligators.

Weather & Water Challenges: Golf maintenance teams are having to maintain cold season and warm season turf in the same place at the same time during the high season. Spring is the time of the year that we call "transition season", where we are not only transitioning from one season to the next but also from one turf type to another. It gets a little too warm for the ryegrass that we put on the tee boxes, however, it's still a little too cool for the bermudagrass to take back over. Dry and drought conditions place extra stress on turf conditions, when only limited amounts of stormwater or reclaimed irrigation water are available for Executive Golf Courses. All our Executive Golf Courses are held to strict water allocations set by Southwest Florida Water Management District or the St. Johns Water Management District. Our courses are not allowed to water more than they are allocated each month. Priority of areas when watering Executive Golf Courses is greens, tees, fairways and lastly the rough. Some of our courses experience high bicarbonate and pH water build-up in the irrigation lines and frequently have irrigation problems such as inoperable sprinkler heads. This makes it necessary for maintenance teams to flush out the system and inject products into the irrigation system to combat the problem. Important applications of fertilizers and pre-emergent herbicides are completed on a seasonal and as-needed basis.

Traffic & High Volumes of Players: High amounts of foot and golf car traffic on the Executive Courses produces compacted soils which increase drainage, disease and weed pressures. With 2.5 million annual rounds on our Executive Courses, they sustain significant damage and abuse from heavy use. The high-use season is January through May. We recognize that the volume of rounds of golf, which far exceeds the "average", for comparable private golf courses and as a result, we have implemented an aggressive 10-year Capital Improvement Plan which will accelerate course renovations. All renovation projects and enhancements to the Executive Golf Courses will be presented to the appropriate Committee and Board as part of an overall asset management plan which consists of multiple renovations annually in addition to smaller, more frequent maintenance projects to ensure courses remain infrastructurally solid. While the average full renovation is every 20 years, we will renovate ours in the ten (10) to twelve (12) year timeframe which will include new greens, tees, fairways and bunkers while incorporating the newer turf varieties that are shade, traffic, and drought tolerant Likewise, numerous, more frequent smaller renovation projects will include bunker sand replenishing and re-grassing tee tops. Divot Repairs: Players sometimes cut the turf during golf strokes or by shuffling their feet. The daily damage caused by divots will depend on the number of rounds played, and we play a lot of rounds of golf annually on our Executive Golf courses. Low-traffic courses don't see frequent divot damage, while heavily used courses need more daily repairs. The most critical divots to fix are those located in the primary field of play.

Ball Marks: One of the other high priorities for Executive Courses is repairing ball marks every day. When golf balls fall from the sky, they make depression marks on the turf. In turn, these marks make the putting green uneven. Consequently, golfers find themselves misdirecting their putts. A properly repaired ball mark heals completely in 2-3 days, while an unrepaired ball mark takes 15-20 days to heal properly. Predictable slope, speed and putting surfaces are crucial to a good golfing experience. Maintenance crews inspect each green with a "ball mark repair tool" to repair all visible marks.

Golf Etiquette and Helping to Maintain The Golf Courses:

- Keep golf cars on assigned paths only.
- Show up early for your tee time and obey the cart path rules. Depending on seasonal
 conditions, driving off the path will result in damage to the turf areas. Also, comply with the
 speed limit rules.
- Golf car tires must have a rounded vertical tread with a maximum depth of ¼ inches. Total tire width must be a minimum of 8 inches. Tire pressure must not exceed 28 psi.
- Fix noticeable ball marks using a tool to close the mark and then smooth with the putter or your foot.
- Before leaving a bunker, a player should carefully smooth over all holes and footprints with the provided rake.
- Practicing good golf etiquette not only enhances the friendly atmosphere that The Villages is known for, but it can make a significant difference in the health and playability of the courses. For example:
 - > Taking the time to fill your divots and repair your ball marks not only provides an even playing surface for the players behind you, but also helps the grass recover and grow in more quickly.
 - Observing cart directional signs and stakes and avoiding driving too close to tees and greens protects the playing surface. Courses are monitored frequently to identify areas that might be especially worn, prone to mud or erosion, or working to regenerate. Please be mindful of these areas as you visit your favorite courses.
 - Retrieving your ball from the cup with your hand slowly and carefully while the flag remains in the cup, in accordance with a recent United States Golf Association (USGA) rules update, means that future putts will not be adversely affected by a cup with dinged edges. When damage does occur, maintenance staff must cut a new hole location an extra step in an already busy day.

- Replace your divots, avoid walking on the steep face of a bunker and repair any pitch marks or indentations caused by hitting the green. Using a tee, knife, key or repair tool, repair the mark by working the edges towards the center, without lifting the center of the mark. Don't tear the grass. Finish by smoothing the area with a club or your foot. Try to get the area smooth enough to putt over.
- Land in the bunker? Take a few moments to rake out your footprints and play area. This makes the area more aesthetically pleasing and playable for the remainder of the day. It also allows the maintenance team to focus on other detailed work.
- Don't talk while others are hitting and do not distract other golfers. Always be silent and stand out of view of golfers. Make sure you stay off your phone and always know when other golfers are hitting.
- > Be careful where you walk at all times, and do not spend too much time looking for balls. When in a group, help other players to find their ball to keep the game play moving.
- Maintain an appropriate pace and avoid slow play. Keep pace with the group ahead of you and keep the game moving. Don't hit a ball into the group ahead of you.
- Don't step on your fellow players putting lines the imaginary line that connects the ball to the hole. If your ball is on a player's line, volunteer to mark the ball. If your ball is not furthest from the cup: mark your ball, either with a plastic marker or a small, thin, dark coin such as an old penny. After you have marked your ball, place your putter down at a 90-degree angle with the heel touching your marker. Move the marker from the heel to the toe of your putter. Reverse the procedure to return the ball to its original position.
- Do not stand where you might distract a fellow player and don't move. Don't make any noise when your fellow player is preparing to putt. If you hold the flagstick, do so at arm's length so the flag doesn't flutter in the breeze, and make sure your shadow doesn't fall across the hole or line. The flagstick should be removed right after the player hits the ball.
- > If you lay down the flagstick, lay it off the green to prevent doing damage to the green.
- Always yell "FORE", when an errant ball is hit towards others. Fore is a commonly used golf term that means "duck and get to cover". While it is rare for someone to get hit by a golf ball, it can happen and may result in serious injury.
- > After everyone has putted out, immediately walk to the next tee.





May Is Melanoma and Skin Cancer Awareness Month

May is Melanoma and Skin Cancer awareness month. It is the month when we truly start to understand why Florida is called 'The Sunshine State." While the sun sustains life and feels good, it can also be your skin's worst enemy. Every sunburn can increase your risk of skin cancer but it's not just those big days at the beach or ballgame that cause trouble. Each time you run out to get the mail, walk the dog or commute to work without sun protection also adds to the damage that can lead to skin cancer (as well as leathery skin, dark spots and wrinkles).

No single method of sun defense can protect you perfectly, though. That's why we created this roundup of advice for you. The best path to beautiful, healthy skin is to adopt as many of these steps as possible into your lifestyle and make them daily habits everywhere you go, all year.

Know your Sunscreen and USE IT!

SPF stands for Sun Protection Factor. The number tells you how long the sun's UVB rays would take to redden your skin when using a particular sunscreen compared with the amount of time without

sunscreen. So if you use an SPF 15 product exactly as directed (applied generously and evenly, and reapplied after two hours or after sweating or swimming), it would take you 15 times longer to burn than if you weren't wearing sunscreen.

Broad spectrum. The words "broad spectrum" on a label indicate that the sunscreen contains ingredients that effectively protect against UVA rays as well as UVB.

Water resistance. While sunscreens can't claim to be waterproof, they can be labeled water resistant for either 40 or 80 minutes. Yes, you can burn even when you're in the water, so reapplying is key!

The Skin Cancer Foundation advises everyone to use a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher every day. For extended outdoor activity, use a water-resistant, broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher. Reapply every two hours or after swimming or sweating.



May Is Melanoma and Skin Cancer Awareness Month

Seek the Seal: The bottom line is that you need several types of sun protection to safeguard your skin. It takes a village! Many products that meet stringent criteria for safe and effective UV protection have earned The Skin Cancer Foundation Seal of Recommendation.

Look for clothing, hats, sunglasses, sunscreens, moisturizers, cosmetics, awnings, umbrellas, window film and more that carry the Seal.

Cover Up! Clothing can provide a great barrier against the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays. Its protection is consistent over time and doesn't wear off like sunscreen does. Many new fabrics offer high-tech protection and breathability, too. The more skin you cover (high neck, long sleeves, pants), the better, and a hat with a wide brim all the way around (three inches or more) is best because it helps shade your eyes, ears, face and neck. Also, wear UV-blocking sunglasses to protect your eyes and the skin around them.

Look for "UPF" protection on labels of clothing, hats, and fabrics. UPF stands for "ultraviolet protection factor. Play in the Shade! When you are outside, think of shade as your refuge, especially between 10 AM and 4 PM, the peak hours of sun intensity.

Walk on the shady side of the street, sit under an awning or sun-protective umbrella, duck into a covered porch at a pool party or even under a tree.

Early Detection Starts with You.

Using sun protection consistently from an early age is the strongest defense against developing skin cancer.

No person or method is perfect, though, and one in five Americans will develop skin cancer by the age of 70.

The Skin Cancer Foundation recommends that all adults do monthly skin self-exams and see a dermatologist annually, or more frequently if they see something suspicious or have risk factors. Learn more about early detection.

Biological waste (urine, feces) and toilet paper are the only materials that should be flushed down the toilet. Toilet paper breaks down in water. Other products do not.

TRASH IT:

Anything else—cotton swabs, baby wipes, wet wipes (even if marked "flushable") and paper towels. These items must be disposed of as domestic waste and NOT flushed down the toilet.



PLACE THESE ITEMS IN THE TRASH, NOT THE TOILET:

- · Paper towels and napkins
- Disinfecting wipes (even if marked "flushable")
- · Baby wipes
- Diapers
- · Feminine hygiene products



These steps will help us keep collection and treatment systems operating properly. If there's no toilet paper and you must use something else, keep a trash bin in the bathroom to dispose of non-toilet-paper products. Clean the bin and surrounding areas regularly. Businesses should provide similar trash bins and consider posting signs reminding patrons not to flush non-toilet-paper products.

Please help us avoid unnecessary sewer clogs and backups.

IRRIGATION SYSTEM FLUSHING: DISTRICTS 5-8

UPDATED 4/17/2023

Beginning in April 2023, our Utilities Operations and Maintenance contractor (Jacobs), will begin flushing the Villages Water Conservation Authority (VWCA) irrigation system located in Districts 5-8. Flushing prevents the accumulation of small particles and build-up, which can lead to plugging issues in our irrigation system. Due to the size of the VWCA system, the area has been divided into

90 distinct flushing zones. Once started, this project will take approximately 50


As the flushing takes place, you will see the Jacobs team opening fire hydrants and flushing irrigation lines only into the roadway. Work hours will be from 8 am to 5 pm. Information will be updated regularly on the District's website on when you can expect to see the Jacobs team in action in your area.
